Churches are represented that have sacrificed manpower, monies, and materials to see a work established, especially on a foreign field. The investment is very large and in some cases larger than those on the soils of familiar countrymen.

Among the guests coming to the ordination for this new minister will be Pastor Edward Barclay, the new pastor, from our sending church. We welcome his attendance for two good reasons. They proudly showed us the hotel room where he stayed. I learned that being someone's guest in an inconvenient spot earns unparalleled respect. It shows people you care about their place. I wish to thank Pastor Edward for taking time to come, because some would shrink away from that responsibility to the high commission of our Lord Jesus! Bro. Edward has been at least prudent in giving my family the space to deal with things when he saw there were many strivings of

heart upon our return for furlough. We consider it a blessing for him to come for the sake of Christ.

We attended the memorial service and paid our respects to Dr. Clarence Sexton during the Christmas break. My wife graduated from The Crown College where my eldest daughter now attends. Dr. Sexton held what their church refers to as the Faithful Friends Conferences. I was not a close friend of his but I did find that Dr. Sexton was truly a faithful friend to God. The day following his passing I wrote down three things that I saw in his life and ministry. First is his influence. He struck me as one of few men who still believed, with a broken heart, in the possibility of a wide spread Biblical revival. Second is the power of one individual. He demonstrated to me personally that he believed one man can make a difference! He allowed the Crown Choir to come, though weary from their Troy Ohio meeting, to sing for our church's Christian school chapel the next morning upon my request. He will always be special to me because of that single act of kindness. Third, Dr. Sexton seemed to promote a wholesome indoctrination. He spoke against modernizations that undermine a holy spirit of corporate worship at God's house and he was not afraid to speak on political issues or candidates. He used his pulpit to make a difference and held to his convictions all the way to the end. Independent Fundamental Baptists will
